In Memoriam

Knowles, John David: 1940 - 2013. John was born in NDG, Que., son of Charles Noel and Gertrude Knowles and youngest brother to Peter, Charles and Elisabeth. As a boy, John loved the Laurentians and the discovery of boats and the winding North River.

After enduring Lower Canada College for several years, he was grateful to escape into a more bohemian



identity at Dalhousie in Halifax, where he studied engineering physics.

During three decades of work at McGill University designing research instrumentation, John was always planning the next iteration before the initial product was delivered. He was passionate about alternate energy and quite despairing about the future of the environment. After retirement, John continued to design innovative medical devices. As one of his McGill colleagues commented, "John's art has a following - and international appeal."

His singing and guitar playing were unique and riv-

eting. Until the end of his life, he took great pleasure in musical sessions and performances with old friends in their group The What Four.

Nobody could match John for storytelling. He kept listeners mesmerized with his tales of youthful adventures and his s p e c u l a t i v e meanderings about alternative lives often instilled wonder in listeners. His voice was

unmistakable and unforgettable, and his humour was quirky, expansive and contagious. John's reaction to a sobering medical diagnosis twenty years ago was, as always, thoughtful and creative. He proved the twoyear prognosis wrong, parlaying his search for solutions into trips and adventures in the two decades that followed.

Sailing with his wife Audrey was a great solace. He described how his shoulders relaxed as the shore receded. It was spiritual for him; dropping anchor one evening after navigating into a remote harbour on Nova Scotia's Eastern Shore, he looked around and said, "It's like coming home to a room in my mansion."

Despite a reflective and somewhat reclusive nature, John had close relationships with many lifelong friends. He cared deeply about his two granddaughters and watched their progress attentively. John died peacefully at home on December 16th.

His presence will be sorely missed by his family, especially his wife Audrey, sister Elisabeth, son Peter, daughter-in-law Julie, grandchildren Erin and Caitlin, and nieces and nephews Wendy, John and Glenn. He will be missed by his musical circle and by his many friends in and out of the fellowship that gave him strength and inspiration, for which he was profoundly grateful.. As you have already been receiving electronic com-



munications f r o m us, we will retain the ability to communicate electronically under an "implicit consent" section of the act for a period of up to 24 months. Members in good standing as of 1 July 2014 fall into this category.

Under the new act we were able to obtain "explicit consent" electronically up until 1 Jul 2014 from about 50% of our membership. Explicit consent has no expiry.

Members who have provided their consent or who are in good standing will continue to retain the right to opt out of receiving electronic communications at any time.

The RUSI(NS) membership and notice of dues forms will be amended to include the appropriate consent language.

Those members, regardless of class, who are NOT members in good standing and have NOT provided their explicit consent will receive a final electronic communication in early September after which their names will be removed from our distribution list.

(Note: The foregoing will also apply to those that only receive electronic communications by phone!)

Parking

It is expected that CFB Halifax will change regulations this fall by which parking at sites including Stadacona and RA Park will be "park & pay" for visitors and for general parking. The Base Commander emailed the following on 16 June 2014 on everyone on the Base intranet:

"As you are undoubtedly aware, there has been considerable discussion related to parking within MARLANT property. We find ourselves in a unique situation at CFB Halifax as a large base in the centre of a thriving city. As a result, a fair market value is deemed to exist at most CFB Halifax locations and, after lengthy review, it has been determined that the fairest and most equitable way of addressing this situation is to expand our current pay parking system to cover all personnel (including contractors, shift workers and visitors) who choose to drive to work and therefore need to park a vehicle.

"I recognize that parking is a very emotional subject for many people so I have directed a team to work towards creating a policy that complies with Treasury Board, DAOD and CRA requirements while at the same time, providing our members with a genuine value proposition – you have my promise that the expansion of pay parking will lead to improved parking and access control at the base. I know that this change in our approach will cause all those who park at CFB Halifax some additional administration to convert to the new system and I certainly don't expect anyone to welcome the thought of paying each month to park their vehicles. That said, this decision will ensure we are in compliance with regulations and I will continue to work with Metro Transit to improve service to our members and to facilitate active transportation for those who want effective alternatives to driving to work each day. As well, we are committed to ensuring effective Base Shuttle and Base Taxi services to enable work-related movement within the base."

Article - Our Veterans Need a New Voice

Canada's veterans are very much in the news these days, with a growing perception that the men and women who served our nation in military uniform are not being well-treated by their government.

It's not an exclusively Canadian problem, of course. Note for example that last week the chief of Veterans Affairs in the U.S. resigned over problems with the treatment of veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan.

Here in this country a relatively small but militant element of the veterans' community has severely criticized the Veterans Affairs department, primarily over alleged failures in the medical treatment and financial compensation of returning military personnel, particularly those suffering from PTSD or other debilitating injuries. The Minister of Veterans Affairs Canada, Julian Fantino, has been subjected to heavy criticism over these and several other issues.

To be sure, the record of both conservative and liberal governments over the past few decades has been less that perfect. Our military's heavy involvement in the Afghanistan War has obviously raised the temperature of the debate. Like all wars, this one took a heavy toll on those who were engaged in the conflict, and this has reminded Canadians that the nation has a solemn obligation to care for those who suffered through service in harm's way. Back in 2006 the government introduced a New Veterans Charter in an attempt to articulate the obligation in practical terms, but not all of it was deemed satisfactory by various veterans organizations.

This raises an interesting point. Historically the Royal Canadian Legion was the dominant voice of Canadian veterans. In recent decades, however, with the passing of so many Second World War veterans, the

Legion's numbers have declined dramatically. Furthermore, fewer than one-third their members today have seen military service, and the percentage continues to decrease. Meanwhile, dozens of new veterans organizations have appeared on the scene. Although all of these, in representing specific groups of veterans, have a legitimate role to play, the net result has been a serious dilution of the collective influence of veterans at large. Against this background a few small activist groups, in going public so forcefully with their criticism and demands, give the impression that they speak for all veterans.

But many of today's veterans – perhaps the great majority – are uncomfortable with some of the rhetoric that has dominated recent headlines. One reason is the growing feeling that the aggressive approach may very

> well be counterproductive, because of a risk that it might alter the positive image that the Canadian public holds of its veterans, which in turn could influence government support for the community. More to the point, unduly antagonizing the officials of VAC can scarcely lead to a productive working environment in the search for solutions to current problems.

> Given the weakening of the Legion's once dominant position and the proliferation of new veterans organizations, there is a growing belief that some form of overarching new veterans organization needs to be created, perhaps under the leadership of the Legion, drawing together the many and varied groups that exist today. Recent attempts in this direction have not been very successful, but the need remains. The entire veterans community must come together from time to time to debate the really important issues of the day, thereby building a strong consensus on how these should be resolved. Only then can veterans speak convincingly and forcefully in seeking constructive solutions from the government of the day.

> Although some veterans may not agree, there is a strong case for establishing a powerful collective voice in this way. It provides the basis for a firm yet co-operative dialogue with government, for the benefit of all Canadian veterans.

It's a move whose time has come.
