## HMCS Windsor Returns to the Water from Navy News

#### 9 October 2014

Her Majesty's Canadian Submarine (HMCS) Windsor was undocked yesterday evening from the Syncrolift at HMC Dockyard in Halifax, after a generator was successfully replaced, scheduled maintenance was performed and a major upgrade to the submarine's main bow sonar system was installed.

On March 31, 2014, HMCS Windsor underwent a docking period for maintenance and repairs at the Captain Bernard Leitch Johnson facility in HMC Dockyard in Halifax.

HMCS Windsor was docked to allow FMF Cape Scott to replace a defective generator discovered during sea trials. The diesel generators are part of the main submarine battery charging system.

The work period was also leveraged to accelerate the planned upgrade of the submarine's sonar processors with state-of-the-art bow sonar system equipment that was previously planned to be installed later in 2016.

HMCS Windsor now begins required equipment tests and trials both in harbour and at sea, and rigorous work ups and crew training, as the submarine resumes its operational program in preparation for future exercises and operations.

Rear-Admiral John Newton, Commander of Maritime Forces Atlantic and Joint Task Force Atlantic, declared:

"This is an important day for HMCS Windsor and its crew as the submarine returns to the water and resumes sea trials. Maritime Forces Atlantic is proud of the dedicated men and women who strive to support our sailors and their operations. The professionalism and skill of our teams at Fleet Maintenance Facility Cape Scott is demonstrated by their commitment and expertise in getting HMCS Windsor ready to carry on the important work Canadians have entrusted us with."

#### In Memoriam

Lieutenant Commander Murray W. Knowles, one of the last corvette captains of WW ll and a long-time supporter of the Canadian Naval Memorial Trust, the Royal United Services Institute (NS) and other military support organizations died at Camp Hill Veterans Memorial Building June 3. He was 97.

"The Canadian Naval Memorial Trust and the military support community have lost a revered veteran and supporter with the passing of Murray Knowles. Throughout his life he willingly accepted responsibility and community service," Commodore (ret'd) Bruce Belliveau, Chair of CNMT said. Dan Tanner, President of RUSI (NS) noted that the Institute – of which Murray Knowles was a past president – recognized Murray at a dinner at the Ashburn Golf Club in June 2012.

A native of Saint John, NB, Murray joined the reserve division HMCS Brunswicker in 1940.After officer training at HMCS Stadacona, he was posted to HMS Rajputana (an armed merchant cruiser). On April 13 1941, the ship was torpedoed off Iceland with the loss of 42 crew. Sub Lieutenant Knowles was in command of a lifeboat with 50 survivors that were rescued 12 hours later and landed in Iceland.

Later, Murray served in minesweepers operating out of Sydney, Halifax and St John's and in July 1942 was appointed CO of HMCS Suderoy V. In late 1943 he was appointed first lieutenant of the corvette HMCS Louisburg ll, sailed for the UK and participated in the D-Day invasion June 6 (the same date his wife Jodie gave birth to their son Stephen in Saint John). Louisburg participated in months of action in the English Channel, including fending off a German E-boat attack on a convoy. Murray was appointed CO of Louisburg in early 1945 and towards the end of hostilities brought the ship back to Canada.

On his return to Halifax he was promoted lieutenant-commander and appointed Staff Officer

(Operations) in HMCS Scotian. During the explosions and fires at the Bedford Magazine in July 1945 he remained on duty in HMC Dockyard throughout the emergency to monitor and report developments to naval headquarters in Ottawa. He retired from the Navy in 1946 to pursue a career in the automotive industry and later began a new career in long-term health administration in the Halifax area.

In addition to being part of the group of naval veterans that succeeded in acquiring HMCS Sackville in the early 1980s and serving as president of RUSI (NS), Murray served as president (and honorary life member) of the NS Naval Officers Association, chair of the Missions to Seafarers/NS, Anglican Church warden and was active in the Royal Canadian Legion, Navy League of Canada and the Masonic Order.

Murray was recognized on a number of occasions over the years including representing naval veterans at the 50<sup>th</sup> and 65<sup>th</sup> anniversaries of the D-Day landings in Normandy. In 2010, he was presented to Her Majesty the Queen and HRH Prince Philip (and in turn presented a CNMT/HMCS Sackville tie to Prince Philip) during the Royal Visit to Sackville as part of the naval centennial celebrations.

He was predeceased by his wife Josephine (Jodie) and survivors include son Stephen and daughter Meredith Westlake. (by Len Canfield)

## Parking at CFB Halifax and RA Park

New parking regulations went into effect as of 1 September 2014. Visitors parking at Stadacona has been consolidated into three lots: outside the Juno Tower entrance, outside the health services clinic entrance, and north of the Naval Museum. Parking for visitors is limited to three hours and is still free. "Pay and display" will be instituted later when parking metres are installed as parking of a parking metre engineering project. The mess manager at RA Park recommends visitors to the mess display their associate members card on their dashboard, or otherwise obtain a pass from the mess.
